# IMMIGRATION & RELOCATION SERVICES FOR NEW AND PROSPECTIVE FACULTY AND SENIOR CPM STAFF

The University's Immigration & Relocation Services provides assistance to prospective and newly appointed faculty and senior managerial (CPM – Confidential, Professional and Managerial) staff with many aspects of their immigration and relocation to Toronto and the surrounding area. York would like to help the whole family make a comfortable transition to York and to the community.

Moving to a new country or a new city is an experience that requires planning, information and support. Since each move is unique, the Immigration & Relocation Coordinator can meet with you to discuss your individual needs and guide you to the resources you need to make your move a smooth one! The Immigration & Relocation Coordinator is available prior to your move at relocate@yorku.ca so you can get your relocation questions answered as they come up.

#### YOUR IMMIGRATION & RELOCATION COORDINATOR:

- Assists your orientation to the city by discussing the unique and exciting qualities
  of Toronto neighborhoods and surrounding areas.
- Explores available real estate options and connects you to real estate companies to assist your housing search.
- Answers your questions on healthcare, financial services and moving to Toronto/Ontario.
- Discusses services for children, including schools, childcare, camps, programs and special needs.

- Connects you to the York University community and the many services and ethnocultural and religious resources Toronto offers that may be of interest to you and your family.
- Offers general information and orientation to Toronto and the University.
- Provides referrals for employment search assistance and resources for spouses/ partners of newly appointed faculty or CPM staff seeking nonacademic positions.
- · Answers your immigration questions.

## GETTING STARTED RELOCATION TIPS AND "TO DOS"

- ✓ Contact York University's Pension and Benefits Administrators for an appointment at 416-736-2100, ext. 27572 or askpb@yorku.ca immediately upon your arrival to ensure that your benefits, healthcare coverage and payroll are started.
- ✓ Apply for a Social Insurance Number (SIN) immediately upon your arrival. The SIN is a nine-digit number that you require to work in Canada or to receive government benefits. Failure to obtain a SIN will result in lack of payment of salary/benefits. Applications for SIN cards can be submitted at a local Service Canada office. The application form and supporting information can be obtained at: http://www.servicecanada.qc.ca/enq/sc/sin.
- ✓ Apply for the Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP):
- If you are arriving from outside Canada, OHIP will cover your basic health care. It is available to all residents of Ontario and is publicly funded. You need to apply immediately upon arriving in Ontario. Information on OHIP can be found at: http://www.health.gov.on.ca/en/public/programs/ohip. After applying for it, there is a three-month mandatory waiting period before your health coverage begins. In the interim, the University belongs to an alternative carrier,: the University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP). UHIP will provide coverage to you and your family while you are waiting to be covered by OHIP. It is mandatory for you to have either OHIP or UHIP coverage. When you arrive in Ontario, please make an appointment with York University's Pension and Benefits office to arrange your UHIP coverage.
- If you are moving to Ontario from another Canadian province, there is a three-month waiting period before you are eligible for OHIP. During this waiting period, you will be covered by the health insurance of your previous province for up to three months. You then need to apply for OHIP coverage when you arrive in Ontario. - ✓ If you are not a Canadian citizen or permanent resident and have accepted a permanent position, you must apply for 'Permanent Residence' upon soon after your arrival in order to retain your permanent job. The guide and application Information can be found at: http://www.cic.qc.ca/english/immigrate/index.asp.
- ✓ Ask the Relocation Coordinator about our Mentor Program. We'll connect you with a York University faculty member or management employee who has also relocated and will be happy to provide you with friendly direction.
- Extensive public transportation, linking you to and from York University allows you
  the flexibility to decide where you may want to live.
- The Toronto Transit Commission (TTC) subway system, linked with buses and street cars, will get you around Toronto. For information, visit www.city.toronto.on.ca/ttc.
- The GO Transit network of trains and buses serves Toronto and the surrounding areas. It reaches as far as Hamilton to the west, Newmarket/Barrie/Beaverton to the north, and Newcastle to the east. For information, visit www.gotransit.com.
- York Region Transit buses serve the York region, and link with Brampton, Mississauga and GO Transit systems. For more information and details of the new Viva and Züm system of rapid transit buses, visit www.yorkregiontransit.com and http://www.brampton.ca.
